Introduction to The Adjudicator



Jan Palmer, Super B.Ed MA GodA

Jan trained at Middlesex University where she graduated with a degree in Drama and Education. She has worked extensively in provincial theatre as an actor and director, but is currently headteacher of Hertswood, a Specialist Arts College. She successfully combines a busy academic life with a stimulating theatrical one. In 1998, she was awarded an MA in Theatre and Performance Studies at Rose Bruford College, at the same time as running her own highly inventive theatre company – Shattered Windscreen. Her theatrical

exploits have taken her as far afield as the Edinburgh Fringe Festival as well as to the cliffside Minack Theatre in Cornwall. Jan became an associate member of GodA in 2001 and a full member in 2005.

Jan acted in the winning entry in the 1996 British Theatre Association final, in Neil Simon's 'Play's Skin', and she has directed two All-England winners herself and more than a dozen festival-winning plays in national festivals.

She directed 'The Madness of George III' in 1996, described by veteran theatre critic Frank Rubinfeld as "one of the Minack Theatre's all-time greats".

Her other directing credits include 'The Trial' and 'Metamorphosis' by Steven Berkoff, 'Jumpers' by Tom Stoppard, 'The Rose Tattoo' and '27 Wagons Full of Cotton' by Tennessee Williams, 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' by William Shakespeare, 'Red Noise' by Peter Barnes, 'Nicholas Nickleby' and 'Hard Times' by David Edgar, 'Law Star' by James McClure, 'The Balcony' and 'Deathwatch' by Jean Genet, 'The School of Night' by Peter Whelan, as well as numerous musicals, including 'Seven Brides for Seven Brothers', 'Oklahoma', 'Grease' and 'Cabaret'. As an actor, Jan has been nominated for Best Actress awards as Claire Zachanassian in Durrenmat's 'The Visit'. Florence in Tennessee

Williams' 'A Perfect Analysis Given by a Nurse'; Inez in Jean Paul Sartre's 'In Camera'; Ariel in Shakespeare's 'The Tempest'; Cleopatra in 'Antony and Cleopatra'; Portia in 'The Merchant of Venice' and a host of other roles. Jan loves to get to grips with new plays and projects. In 2000 she directed 'Ayrual' by award-winning poet, Glyn Maxwell, at the Barn Theatre, Welwyn Garden City, followed in 2001 by a new adaptation of 'Arabian Nights', written by Peter Barnes for TV and adapted for the stage by James Harper for the Minack Theatre in Cornwall.

She returned to The Minack in 2003 to direct Simon Callow's adaptation of 'Les Enfants de Paradis', to massive acclaim, and directed the Trevor Nunn and John Caird version of 'Peter Pan' there in the summer of 2005.

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From 'Scrooge' to Benefactor Mr Patrick Taylor

Patrick Taylor was born in December 1933 and is a practicing English Solicitor (as he has been here for the last 46 years). Patrick's parents moved to the Isle of Man in 1966.

Sadly both his parents have passed away – his father in 1970 and his mother in 1979 and although Patrick was not living on the Island at that time, he did take up residence on the Island with his family in October 1987.

Since then Patrick and the companies that he runs on the Isle of Man, Monarch Assurance plc and Bishopwood Trust Limited, have made a habit of sponsoring a number of activities. Most notably in 1991 Patrick and Monarch Assurance plc were invited to sponsor the International Chess Tournament which is held here annually in the autumn. After a preliminary sponsorship of the minor prizes in 1991, Patrick and Monarch Assurance plc provided all prizes in 1992 and continue to do so.

Patrick is proud to say that the Isle of Man International Chess Tournament is now one of the biggest in Europe and provides great opportunities for overseas chess players, which include a number of Grand Masters and International Masters. The tournament does much to enhance the reputation of the Isle of Man in the world of chess.

In 1999 the Manx Operatic Society decided to produce the musical 'Char' and Patrick was approached towards the end of that year's chess tournament to see



if he would be interested in sponsoring the production, to which Patrick agreed. The Manx Operatic Society then invited Patrick to sponsor the next seven productions which he did and is still sponsoring the Society.

During these sponsorships Patrick was elected Patron of the Society in 2002 and last year he was given the honour of Life Membership. He was then asked to appear in 'Scrooge' as a member of the chorus and did so, conducting his participation from a wheelchair on stage. His portrayal as Sir Edmund Stryth is featured in the accompanying photograph.

It was as a result of that participation that Patrick became known to MADF and this year he was asked to provide sponsorship to them and for the Easter Festival of Plays which he has provided through Bishopwood Trust Limited.

Patrick and MADF hope that his connection will continue for the future.

Isle of Man Bank Young Actor of Mann Award 2006

During the Festival, six of the Island's leading drama students will be bidding to follow in the footsteps of Tony Echles who was last year's winner of the Isle of Man Bank Young Actor of Mann award.

This year's event was organised by Jacqui Hawkes, who also runs the Stage One Drama School. The 2006 finalists were chosen during the One Act Festival from 13 entries by Mike Kaiser GoDA and the standard of work exhibited then will clearly give our adjudicator, Jan Palmer-Sayer, a hard task. Jan will be choosing a winner from Amelia O'Shea, Olivia O'Shea, Emma Syle, Andrew Vyne, John Walker and John Young. Some of our young performers have reached the final before, whilst others are making their first appearance, but win or not we are sure they will

enjoy the experience which may be a stepping stone to a career in the theatre.

All our finalists will be presented with certificates to mark the occasion while the winner, as part of their Isle of Man Bank sponsorship, attends a Drama Summer School in the British Isles. The final takes place on Wednesday 19th April at 2pm in the Kensington Youth Centre, Douglas and it would be nice if as many of our patrons as possible could be present to support the young people.

To carry out the presentation of the Young Actor of Mann awards during the last night of the Festival on Friday 21st April we welcome back David Saunders, Head of Premium Banking at Isle of Man Bank. David has performed this role many times and, in fact, was instrumental in establishing the Bank's sponsorship 20 years or so ago.

It goes without saying that The Federation is extremely grateful to Isle of Man Bank for its continued involvement with this particular award and the arts in general.

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Belvoir Players

The Players

Belvoir Players Amateur Dramatic Society was formed in 1968 and has become Northern Ireland's "most attractive drama group". They make over sixty performances each year with tours throughout the Province in July and August, at least two one act plays in November, a pantomime at Christmas and full length productions in the Spring. In 2000 they opened their own rehearsal studio on Belvoir Drive and now, with the closure of the Group Theatre in Belfast, other societies are using the Studio as a venue for their productions. It is also being used by a large variety of community organizations for meetings, demonstrations, exhibitions and all sorts of performances.

2005/6 will see them complete their busiest season yet. They have made thirty performances of 'Wedding Fever' over the Summer months, three one act plays in the Festival circuit, a pantomime running for fifteen performances in the Studio and this Spring they are competing in the full length festival circuit with two productions.

The Play

Between 1938 and the outbreak of World War II, almost 10,000 children, most of them Jewish, were sent by their parents from Germany to Britain.

Eva, nine years old, ends up with gentle foster parents in Manchester and when her natural parents fail to escape the Nazi regime in Germany she changes her name and begins the process of denial of her roots. It is only when her own daughter discovers some old letters in the attic that Eva is forced to confront the truth about her past.

The play takes place in a spare storage room in Evelyn's house in an outer London suburb in recent times.

The Players

The Garden Suburb Theatre is well known to MADD as we have, during the period 1997 to date presented six plays at the Easter Festival, three of them with 'Death' in the title! We are one of the largest groups in North West London, certainly one of the oldest, dating from 1907 and we pride ourselves on high standards. We have around 200 members and put on plays in a number of local venues, including our home base school hall but we also present smaller plays in a pub theatre in Highgate as well as our annual outdoor production in a wood setting just off the North Circular Road. One of our Winter shows is always for a family audience and the Summer outdoor production is often a Shakespeare or a 'Classic'. We try to have a varied season and this year, for example, we have a programme which, as well as *'Amy's View'* has included *The Japanese Gull*, and we are moving on to present *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, *Tullin Angel* by Noel Coward, *Round and Round the Garden* by Alan Ayckbourn and the 18th Century comedy romp *The Country Wife* by William Wycherley. We have charitable status on the basis of our work with children and our contribution to the Barnet Arts and Leisure environment. We partake in many festivals and have had some great successes in terms of awards but far more important is the excitement of performing in new venues and the friendships that have grown out of our love of touring our productions.

The Play

1979: Eame Allen is a well known West End actress at that point when theatre is ceasing to offer actors a regular way of life. The visit of her daughter Amy with her new boyfriend begins a series of events that only find their final shape sixteen years later. David Hare's play mixes love, death, the aging process and the theme in a television and Tarantino age, in a heady and original play. It has much to say about England during the years between 1979 and 1995.

David Hare is one of Britain's most political playwrights and although this play is unmistakably political, it is profoundly about the changing relationship between Eame and her daughter Amy.

The play was a sell out at the national Theatre during the first few months of the Blair government and transferred to the West End in January 1998.

The Players

This award winning young company is made up of current and former pupils of the Arnold School, Blackpool and are no strangers to the Festival circuit having appeared at the MADF Easter Festival over the past five years with productions as diverse as Arthur Miller's *A View from the Bridge*, Harold Pinter's *The Birthday Party*, Marie Jones' *A Night in November*, *The Woman Who Cooked Her Husband* by Debbie Isitt and Phil Young's *Crystal Clear*. Many of these productions have won awards at festivals across the British Isles, including the Isle of Man and many of the performers in these productions have gone on to prestigious Drama Schools and to work in professional theatre and television.

In yer Space have also performed several productions in the Isle of Man in pub tours in Douglas and surrounding areas.

The Play

Hannah and Hanna is the tale of two teenage girls, both seeking their own kind of asylum, one from Kosovo and one from Margate. Pop music mad Hannah likes to sing karaoke but what she doesn't like is that Kosovitch Hanna is stealing her thunder on her favourite song. Hannah is not aware that she and Hanna will become friends against all odds. They bond over a mutual love of pop music and develop a friendship that transcends the bigotry and prejudice that surrounds them. The play has been described as "bold, politically committed and brilliantly aware".

The play is set in Margate and Kosovo in 2000/1

Cytringan Players

The Players

The Cytringan Players are celebrating their 70th anniversary in 2006 with a year-long programme of events to mark their contribution to amateur theatre in their home town of Kettering, Northants.

The company usually presents two full length play productions a year at the Castle Theatre Studios in nearby Wellingborough but in this special anniversary year have added a third production to their season.

In addition the group competes in the one act play circuit and uses the opportunity to work on more challenging material that might not otherwise prove commercially viable in a small theatre.

Over the past few years the Cyps, as they are locally known, have produced plays as diverse as *The Flea Over the Cactus* (Nuff), *Memory of Water*, *Green Lake*, *Confusion*, *Dual Fanny* and the amateur world premier of Vilma Hollingsbury's *To this the Day!*

The Cytringan Players have always regarded competing in festivals as a valuable part of their theatrical life and have achieved a high level of success in both one act and full length competitions.

Successes with one act plays have included wins in the Luton, Bedford, Welwyn and Haverhill festivals as well as the British All Winners Finals and they have won full length festivals at Newport and Felixstowe.

The Play

This Pulitzer prize-winning play, recently revived on Broadway with Brenda Blethyn as the Mother, is a powerful examination of loneliness, failure and despair. Jessie's father is dead; her loveless marriage ended in divorce; her absent son is a petty thief and a ne'er-do-well; her last job didn't work out and, in general, her life is stale and unprofitable.

As the play begins Jessie asks for her father's service revolver and calmly announces that she intends to kill herself. At first her mother refuses to take her seriously, but as Jessie sets about tidying the house and makes lists of things to be looked after, her sense of desperate helplessness begins to build.

In the end, with the inevitability of genuine tragedy, she can only stand by, stunned and unbelieving, as Jessie quietly closes and locks her bedroom door and ends her profound unhappiness in one fatal, stunning and deeply disturbing moment – a moment never to be forgotten by those who have witnessed and come to understand, her plight.

This eloquent, enthralling, at times very funny and ultimately shattering play explores the final hour in the life of a young woman who has decided that life is no longer worth living.

Wakefield Little Theatre

The Players

Wakefield Little Theatre was formed in 1948 and has a membership of around sixty people. On average they present six plays a year, mainly at Wakefield Little Theatre – a Matcham Theatre, at the Lampoon Theatre in Barnsley and at Dewsbury Little Theatre. They perform everything from Cooney to Shakespeare – and spend a lot of time in the pub! That's why they enjoy the Isle of Man Festival so much.

This is WLT's tenth visit to the festival. Previous entries have been 'Blood Brothers', 'A Man for All Seasons', 'The Crucible', 'Murderer', 'The Wally of the Tinahore', 'Yeats's Greeting', 'It Rains in The Family' and 'Helen's Choice'. After several third place awards, the company had its best result last year as runner up with 'Shadowlands' and this year will be hoping to go one better. Since last year's festival, WLT has presented 'The Humming', which came third in the Wakefield Festival, 'Charley's Aunt', 'Nones Off', 'James and the Giant Peach', and 'The Borrowers'. In addition several members of tonight's company have recently completed a highly successful run of 'Dad's Army'.

The Play

The action of the play is set in August 1947 in the USA – 700 miles west of New York.

Joe Keller loves his family above all else and has sacrificed everything, including his honour, in his struggle to make the family prosperous. He has lost one son, Larry, in the war and is keen to see his remaining son Chris, marry. Chris wishes to marry Ann, the former fiancée of his dead brother. Keller's wife, Kate, believes Larry to be still alive. It is this belief which has enabled her, for three and a half years, to support Joe by concealing her knowledge of the dreadful crime he committed, but storm clouds loom.....

Premier Theatre Company

The Players

Originally the brainchild of Tony and Sarah-Jane Stone, the Premier Theatre company was formed in 1995 with one intention; to stage a Tenth Anniversary production of 'Cleo - The Musical'. A challenging production by any standards with hi-tech lighting systems, video walls and live broadcast input to name but a few. Another significant challenge was not to use professional performers and yet to produce a show that was far from amateur, a challenge that was evidently achieved judging by the rave reviews and the smashing of the box-office record for that type of production. After six months of rehearsal the cast set foot onto the stage at the Grand Theatre, Blackpool in May 1996 with Sir Tim Rice as its opening night guest, and have never looked back.

The word "Theatre" in the company name, had always been a deliberate choice, ensuring that Premier did not limit its ambition to the production of just musicals, and in 2002, another landmark project was undertaken to bring the first promenade production of a Shakespearean play, 'The Merchant of Venice' to the scenic grounds of Blackpool's Stanley Park, utilising multiple locations, state of the art mobile sound technology and a cast drawn from existing performers and new talent alike. The production was hugely well received, both publicly and critically and so successful that the company was invited back the following year for another Shakespearean play.

And what of the future?

Work is already under way for the European Premiere of the Broadway hit 'Juno - The Musical' coming to the Grand Theatre in Blackpool in June/July 2006.

The Play

Rita, a working class hairdresser with a sharp wit is to marry Denny and at 28 doesn't want a baby. She wants to discover herself so she joins the Open University where she meets Dr. Frank Bryant, an alcoholic college literature professor whose life is a shambles. Divorced, Bryant's new lover is now having an affair with his best friend and he's increasingly depressed, seeking solace in whisky. Bryant's domestic turmoil is mirrored by Rita's, as she has opted for college over motherhood, a source of friction between her and her husband.

Rita blossoms intellectually under the tutelage of Bryant, she realises that what she really lacks is self-confidence, not education, and a gentle romance blossoms between her and Bryant.

As Rita's intellectual perspective expands, she becomes torn between her oppressive home life and the attractive, but perentious world of her ambitious man.

Authors Note

"What I have not tried to reset the play in the 21st century, what I have done is cut and edit and rewrite in such a way that the play can be perceived as taking place in its own time (something that just wasn't possible when the text contained references to figures and institutions and attitudes firmly of the late 1970s/early 1980s. I'm convinced that, for any company, this version would be something of a breeze".
